

New CHEPA member

CHEPA recently welcomed **Katherine Cuff** as a new member. Dr. Cuff, a Professor in McMaster's Department of Economics, holds the Canada Research Chair in Public Economic Theory. She is also the Managing Editor, **Canadian Journal of Economics**, and a recipient of the honorific title, University Scholar, which honours more junior McMaster faculty who have "already distinguished themselves as international scholars."

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Grants



Emmanuel Guindon is co-Principal Investigator on two research projects related to tobacco and smoking funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (\$420,752) and by CIHR and the Canadian Cancer Society (\$100,000).

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Arthur Sweetman, who led a 10person expert panel studying staffing in Ontario Long-Term Care Homes, received several grants related to research on long-term care staffing and on labour market dynamics affected by COVID-19, including a grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (\$44,898) and funding from McMaster University.

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The **McMaster Health Forum** was awarded over \$550,000 through an AGE-WELL grant for its project on building technology-enabled, agingfocused rapid learning health systems in Canada. Over the next three years, the Forum aims to spark the actions needed to build technologyenabled, aging-focused rapid-learning health systems (RLHS) in provincial and territorial health systems in Canada. Principal Investigator **Michael Wilson**, Assistant Director of the Forum, says the grant is "particularly relevant now given the renewed attention and focus on long-term care and the implications of COVID-19 on the system."



Four CHEPA members: John Lavis, Jean-Éric Tarride, Meredith Vanstone and Feng Xie, were part of a large group of McMaster researchers awarded a CIHR Project grant for "Vascular events In noncardiac Surgery patients cOhort evaluatioN study-2 (VISION-2) igators". The research will build on a previous VISION study and involve 20,000 patients across multiple centres. It received \$673,000 from CIHR and

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additional funds of \$2,178,000 from in-kind, industry and partner contributions.

Andrew Costa, and the Big Data & Geriatric Models of Care Research Group launched yourCARE+, an online education platform to help informal caregivers care for themselves and their loved ones. It includes free videos, resources and a caregiver toolkit to support caregivers and families, including a COVID Caregiver Backup Plan.





Hsien Seow, the Canada Research Chair in Palliative Care and Health System Innovation and lead of the <u>Caregivers4Change Network</u>, helped draft a Declaration of Family Caregiver Rights and Responsibilities. The organization is gathering names on a **petition** asking government officials to respect the rights set out in the Declaration to ensure that caregivers won't be locked out of health institutions due to a second wave of COVID.

Arthur Sweetman, the Ontario Research Chair in Health Human Resources, led a 10-person expert panel studying staffing in Ontario's Long-Term Care

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Homes. The report, released on July 30, says the LTC sector urgently needs more funding and permanent staff. The findings received considerable media attention, including this **article** in **The Globe and Mail**.

Media

Research conducted by CHEPA members into the design, staffing and financing of long-term care facilities, as well as the impact on residents and their families of the lengthy lockdowns imposed during the first wave of COVID-19 received a great deal of media attention. Some of the coverage includes:

- Andrew Costa, who holds the Schlegel Research Chair in Clinical Epidemiology & Aging, was quoted extensively over the summer by *Kitchener Record*, <u>Hamilton</u> <u>Spectator</u> and <u>CBC radio</u> reporters about research showing that older nursing homes with outdated designs leave residents more vulnerable to COVID-19.
- Health Policy PhD candidate Amina Jabbar, who is a physician and geriatrician, coauthored an opinion article in the *Toronto Star*: "Preparing nursing homes for a second wave starts with staffing."
- <u>Hsien Seow</u> was quoted in a *Maclean's* article: <u>"The pandemic has disrupted</u> death and mourning in ways we don't yet understand".
 - The <u>Hamilton Spectator</u> also reported on a study Seow is involved in that is studying the effects of the <u>#CareMongering</u> initiative to reduce isolation among seniors during the pandemic.
 - As well, several outlets including the <u>Lethbridge Herald</u> quoted Seow in articles about the <u>Declaration of Family Caregiver Rights and Responsibilities</u>, and the accompanying petition.
