Why do pregnant women use cannabis?

Research led by **Meredith Vanstone** investigating why pregnant and breastfeeding women use cannabis suggests they do so to manage pregnancy-related symptoms and

pre-existing conditions, including nausea and vomiting, mental health and insomnia. The study results were published in the [Canadian Medical Association Journal](#).

Fourth jab will protect the elderly

A fourth booster of COVID-19 vaccine will soon be offered to long-term care, retirement home and assisted living residents in Ontario, an action informed by research conducted by McMaster's [COVID in Long-term Care Study](#). [Andrew Costa](#) is a lead scientist on the study.

The research shows a fourth dose, given three months after the third jab, provides better protection from COVID-19's Omicron wave to vulnerable elderly people.

The study, in partnership with Schlegel Villages, St. Joseph's Health System, and Health Sciences North Research Institute, involves more than 1,000 residents, staff, and visitors of long-term care homes in Ontario.

The work is part of [Canada's Global Nexus for Pandemics and Biological Threats](#), an international network based at McMaster, with scientists, clinicians, engineers, social scientists and other experts working collaboratively to prevent future pandemics and mitigate global health threats.

Laura Anderson leads a group of researchers who will seek to identify cancer risk factors stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic and the measures imposed to contain the spread of the virus, such as social distancing.

The two-year study, entitled *“Identifying changes in cancer risk factors during the COVID-19 pandemic and predicting population risk,”* is funded by a CIHR - ICR / Cancer Research Society Partnership - Research Grant.

Feng Xie is part of an international team of researchers which secured more than \$1M in funding from the European Joint Program for Rare Diseases for a project titled "Patient-reported, health economic, and psychosocial outcomes in Friedreich Ataxia (PROFA)," a rare inherited disease that causes progressive nervous system damage and movement problems.
