Report details how to make critical antibiotics available in Canada

Resistance to antibiotics was associated with more than 14,000 deaths in Canada in 2018, but the global pipeline for new antimicrobials isn't keeping pace with the problem. Moreover, Canada lags behind other comparable countries in accessing some of the drugs that currently exist.

Overcoming Resistance, a report by an expert panel looking into how to ensure a more stable supply of antimicrobials in the future, co-written by CHEPA director **Jean-Éric Tarride**, suggests that a new compensation model of subscription-based "pull incentives" would help drive research, development and commercialization of novel antimicrobials in Canada. It was published by the Council of Canadian Academies and sponsored by the Public Health Agency of Canada.


'Hope for the best, plan for the rest'

The session, entitled "**Transforming the Trajectory of Sepsis**," had participants sharing research evidence about sepsis across the continuum of care to promote knowledge mobilization; encourage patient and community involvement in sepsis research, and align sepsis research priorities to reflect the diverse needs and perspectives of Canadians.

Michael Wilson presented at the World Health Organization (WHO) virtual Global Evidence-to-Policy (E2P) Summit 2023 on a panel about "Citizen-backed evidence – Engaging citizens in providing evidence synthesis and support." Across Canada, the implementation of Jordan's Principle – and its Inuit equivalent, the Inuit Child First Initiative – has improved access to services that were previously only marginally available to First Nations and Inuit children. Driven by rulings from the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal, the implementation of Jordan's Principle has radically redefined Canada's obligations to First Nations children, dramatically increased funding for services to First Nations children, and opened new pathways and possibilities for First Nations to design and implement services.
